
I once again extend my sincere gratitude and appreciation to lan for over a quarter of a century of service to IPSC and his friendship. I congratulate him on a much deserved award.



#### **The Opening Ceremony**

The Opening Ceremony on October 12th was truly a spectacular event, in more ways than one!. Competitors and officials assembled at the staging area situated at the Lakeland Center, roughly a mile from their final destination, the magnificent Lake Mirror, where dignitaries, family, friends and well-wishers were seated in eager anticipation.

While everyone awaited arrival of the procession at Lake Mirror, entertainment was provided by the swinging sounds of the Harrison School of the Arts Jazz Band, which played a variety of well-known, foot-tapping American classics.


### It's an impressive sight to see over 70 different national flags standing proudly, side-by-side, as a visual depiction of the global camaraderie that exists in IPSC.

Back at the staging area, after everyone had lined-up alphabetically behind their respective flags, motorcycle officers from the Lakeland Police Department gave an unhurried police escort as the procession leisurely meandered its way through the streets of Downtown Lakeland, much to the enjoyment of the wonderful townsfolk from the City of Lakeland who lined both sides of the streets to express their spirited support.

The waves and cheers from onlookers made everyone in the procession feel extremely welcome, as we did the entire time we were in Central Florida.

Additionally, glorious classic cars and multiple marching bands were interspersed at regular intervals throughout the parade, and they added even more color and whimsy to the procession.

When each group arrived at the central rostrum at the stunning Lake Mirror, uniformed members of the Central Florida Aerospace Academy Air Force Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps received the flags from each flag-bearer and, with military precision, respectfully placed them into a semi-circular array of flag holders that had been strategically placed on either side of the rostrum.

And as more and more fluttering flags were installed into their holders, the panoramic vista of Lake Mirror and its environs became increasingly striking and beautiful.

It's an impressive sight to see over 70 different national flags standing proudly, side-by-side, as a visual depiction of the global camaraderie that exists in IPSC.




As the name of each arriving team was announced, the assembled crowd at Lake Mirror gave them another warm and energetic welcome.



However, when the large US contingent (who were placed last in the national procession, as all host nations are) finally arrived, the welcome understandably became more energetic, with passionate and stirring chants of "U-S-A" reverberating in and around the area.

The final group to enter the arena was the dedicated cadre of National and International Match Officials, hailing from 25 different nations. They were tasked with guiding and assisting competitors, many of whom were attending their first IPSC Handgun World Championship, to shoot safely for the duration of the competition.











After all the participants had arrived, everyone was asked to stand while a charming 11 year old Chloe Tomlinson gave an awe inspiring, a-cappella rendition of the US National Anthem "The Star-Spangled Banner", much to the delight of the crowd. Her performance was truly exceptional.

That was quickly followed by an aerial display by light aircraft flying low over Lake Mirror, while the Cypress Gardens Water Ski team gave an exciting performance. Finally, a performer dazzled the crowd by using an absolutely amazing water-jet pack which made him resemble the evil Dr. Octopus from the Spiderman movie as he twirled acrobatically above the water!

After short speeches by Match Director Frank Garcia, and a number of Lakeland City and Polk County officials, IPSC President Nick Alexakos declared that the games were officially open.

His declaration was quickly followed by an exciting fireworks display over Lake Mirror.

#### The Range

The Universal Shooting Academy range at Frostproof had been extensively expanded in the three years leading up to the event. The long, thermometer-shaped, central corridor had most of the 30 shooting stages situated on either side, with the final group of stages situated within the "bubble" at the far end.

Each stage had been fitted with sturdy shelters, and both the range and other surfaces had received ample preparation against the elements. Thankfully, though, we were blessed with fine weather for the duration of the event. The nearby Vendor Tent was quite large, and we suspect that a lot of US currency changed hands as competitors scrambled to buy match souvenirs and other products.


There's no doubt that the capital expenditures at the range will serve it well for decades to come.

The stages were attractively decorated by the Alexander Family, a three-man team of talented individuals who used their skills to bring the stages to life. Of course, each stage and area displayed the banner of the respective sponsor, and this served to add more vibrancy and color.

#### **The Competition**

Although there were over 1,300 competitors participating, IPSC's half-day format where competitors shoot either in the morning or in the afternoon, on a rotating schedule, meant that a maximum of 50% of the field were shooting the stages at any one time. As such, the range was always busy, but it never felt crowded.

The standard ratio of 3 Short Courses to 2 Medium Courses to 1 Long Course was observed, and the various challenges they presented required

competitors to utilize every skill in their armory if they were to have any chance of success.

As usual, there were traps for young players! While everyone took an extra nanosecond to aim more carefully at targets placed at 15 meters and beyond, the misleading ease of targets that were placed at under 10 meters were taken for granted and, sadly, many competitors suffered misses on them.

Signature stages included Stage 13 where 10 rounds had to be fired while competitors were standing inside a V shaped platform. Another was Stage 4, where the 29 rounds had to be fired while moving along a winding passageway.

#### The 2014 IPSC General Assembly

Held on October 11th at the Lakeland Center, this annual gathering of Regional Directors from around the globe was a friendly and productive event, as usual.

The key points of business included approval of modified rules for 2015, presentation and approval of the 2013 accounts, reports from the IPSC President and other members of the IPSC Executive, the admittance of three new provisional regions (Gibraltar, India and Panama), and other house-keeping matters, including updates in respect of the match calendar for the next three years.

The venue for the 2017 IPSC Handgun World Championship was put to a vote, and France emerged victorious over the other two contenders Brazil and Thailand.

#### The Awards Dinner

Although having over 1,300 competitors is already a new record for an IPSC World Championship, attendance at the Awards Dinner on 19 October surpassed 1,800 people, as family and friends joined competitors, officials and sponsors to celebrate the end of yet another successful event.










The overall individual champions were Rob Leatham (USA, Classic Division), Max Michel (USA, Open Division), Eric Grauffel (France, Production Division), Ricardo Lopez (Ecuador, Revolver Division) and Nils Jonasson (USA, Standard Division).

A more comprehensive set of results has been uploaded to the IPSC website.


As far as playing National anthems for winners was concerned, The Star-Spangled Banner obviously enjoyed the most air time, due to the depth and strength of the huge American contingent.

However, other nations were not totally overlooked, with Advance Australia Fair, La Marseillaise and the national anthems of Ecuador, Finland, Russia and

the Philippines among others to enjoy a bit of air time.

#### Conclusion

At the end of the event, 1,300 competitors safely fired over 650,000 rounds downrange, and this is testament to the superb gun-handling skills of our competitors, and the excellent training of our Match Officials.

All things considered, IPSC Handgun World Shoot XVII in Florida raised the bar to such a dizzying height, there's no doubt that the moniker "Best World Shoot Ever" is a fitting tribute, and one that will be extremely difficult to outshine in the future.



The Slovak Republic (or Slovakia) is a country situated in the heart of Europe, with a total area 49,0039 sq km and a population 5.38 million.

Some 80% of the country is mountainous, with the highest peak being Gerlach Peak (2,655 metres). Popular mountain sport activities among the High Tatras include skiing, snowboarding and cycling.

The most famous rivers are the Danube, Vah, Hron, Ipel, Hornad and Nitra, but only the Danube is used for river transportation. The longest river is Vah. The largest reservoir is Zemplinska Sirava, which is also called The Slovak Sea.

The country is rich in fauna, and most animal species live in the mountainous woodland. A vibrant agricultural industry has nearly 50% of land being arable and used for growing wheat, corn, sugar, beet, hops, sunflower, potatoes and tobacco. Farming of sheep, pigs, cattle and poultry are primary indutries. Communist rule ended in Czechoslovakia during the peaceful Velvet Revolution. On January 1st 1993, into two independent states were created: the Czech Republic and the Slovak Republic.



Slovakia became a democratic republic with a parliamentary system, and the capital city is Bratislava, which is famous for cultural monuments, museums and galleries. Across the country you can find nice mountains, national parks, historical towns with numerous spas using the healing power of waters, modern shopping centres, cinemas, theatres and pubs, among other exciting tourist attractions.



IPSC was established in Slovkia in 1997, when the Slovak Association of Practical Shooting was formed. We are proud of our competitors who have represented our country at international IPSC Handgun matches. For example, Andrej Hrnciarik became IPSC Production Division Junior World Champion in 2011, in addition to previously being European Champion in 2010.

Slovakia became a democratic republic with a parliamentary system, and the capital city is Bratislava, which is famous for cultural monuments, museums and galleries.

Marián Vysny took overall 1st place at the IPSC Latin American Handgun Championship in 2010, and he has also placed highly at other IPSC matches held in Europe. Ivan Hos took 1st place at the inaugural IPSC Shotgun World Championship in Hungary in 2012.

Last year two of our range officials, Grubiak Stanislav and Szabó Alexander, became members of IROA. Although our country is rather small, our presence can be felt at various levels in IPSC.

We also organise a number of IPSC Level III matches each year, including the famous Mosquito Handgun Match, the Bathory Cup, the Arsenal Cup, the Danube Cup, and of course the Slovak National Championship.

We currently have 25 shooting clubs in Slovakia, and we expect that our membership growth will continue to expand as more and more people learn about the fun and excitement of IPSC shooting.





## Do you prefer open sights or optics? Why?



Hans Simanihuruk, 22 Student **INDONESIA** 

I prefer open sights since it's more challenging because you need to stabilize rear and front sights. Another reason is I find it simpler because there's no need for battery and on/off switch. Finally, it's cheaper than optics.



Alexander Hellström, 24 **Steel Worker SWEDEN** 

I prefer open sights because in my opinion they are more reliable over time due to simplicity and robustness. I also think I focus more on every shot to feel the bullseye rather then just seeing it.



Premek Marek, 32 Real Estate Investor **CZECH REPUBLIC** 

I prefer open sights for several reasons. First is the faster acquisition time for the first shot and sight line closer to the bore line. Also my accuracy is better with open sights due to vision issues (short sighted and astigmatism).



Mark Gonzalez, 27 I.T. Help Desk Specialist **UNITED STATES** 

I prefer optics since with age comes difficulties adjusting my eyesight.

Despite the fact that optics can be a bit more expensive, I find them very easy for me to adjust on the range.



Stéphane Quertinier, 46 **Chief of Police FRANCE** 

I think IPSC shooters must master both sighting systems. The open sights remain the fundamental target of the shooting, while optics bring some comfort. Still, I have a preference for optical sighting.



Tim Yepes, 39 Businessman BRASIL

I prefer open sights because I find them very simple to adjust and maintain. There is no expensive optics to buy and keep safe, they don't break as easy and overall I find them more reliable.



Claudia Alcázar, 39 **Full Time Mom GUATEMALA** 

I prefer open sights, because I'm used to them... also there's the added bonus that they don't depend on batteries!



Markus Drott, 52 **Teamlead Technical Service GERMANY** 

I prefer optics because there are less technical parts which can go wrong on the stage.

It's more the "pure" shooting, with as less technical aids as possible.



Pia Clerté, 44 **Marketing Manager SWEDEN** 

I feel open sights are more challenging to use because of the need of perfect alignment of the eye and the sight axis, and also because your aiming eye is focused on the front sight, not on the target, while the other eye is closed.

#### What are the biggest challenges you have when shooting IPSC?



#### What other sports or activities do you enjoy besides IPSC shooting?



#### Are you active in any other sport?


At home I do some muscle strengthening exercises and I also play soccer sometimes.

## A LESSON IN PREPARATION: (

TWO ARE ONE. ONE IS NONE.

Make no mistake about it. You are an athlete. And you do a lot of things to ensure that we are as good as we can be the day of the competition.

We plan our meals carefully. We weigh everything out to the gram for weeks on end. And we all know the training and practice itself is intense. Yet there is one thing that seems to stump people on a pretty regular basis. It is the challenge of being able to meet the unexpected developments in our day-to-day lives and maintain our diets during those times.

Many of our most elite military units have a saying that says "Two are one. One is none". They apply this in a lot of different ways. But the concept is simple: Always have a backup in a given situation. Granted, we are not jumping out of planes and saving the day in this sport. However, we should borrow a page from their playbook here.

start with nutrition. Planning and packing daily meals is nothing new. But what if something happened to your cooler? What if you dropped a meal in the dirt actually). What if you pack enough food for the next 6 hours but you suddenly find yourself stuck on the side of the road for another 6 hours? Are you prepared for this?

Most people might say "How do you prepare for that? There are too many unknowns". A great point. If you put your mind to it, you will be surprised with what you can come up with to mitigate these crazy things that could potentially throw your diet a huge curveball.

So how do we apply this? Let's First, I recommend packing several extra meals each day when you leave the house. Take extra water too. We all take X amount of food and water when we diet because we know that is what we are going to need. Take a few extra meals though. This will (that just happened to a client cover you a lot more than you may think.

> Secondly, take the extra food idea one step further. The military often uses what is called a "bug-out bag". Inside this small bag, they put the bare-bone survival essentials. If the military operator has to leave a scene instantly and abandon all their gear, this is the bag they have on their person 24/7. This bag saves their life in that moment. use. Take this and apply it to your diet, it'll save that too in a pinch. Get a small bag or container of some sort. Inside it, pack some non-perishable essentials. For me, I pack things like protein powder, beef jerky, dried fruit and oats. Choose foods that last a long time if properly sealed and stored. Then put that pack in your car. Or your purse. Or your locker at work. If you really want to cover your bases, make a couple of these and leave them wherever you frequent.

Some may think this is a little crazy. But think for a second. Is it really that crazy in the scope of everything else we do to be at our absolute best? Is being prepared for the unknown a bad idea? Most of us have a fire extinguisher in the house. We have smoke alarms. We have first-aid kits. This is merely an extension of that kind of planning.

Crazy or just good preparation? I'll let you guys decide. When you do, just ask yourself this one question: would I want to stand next to a person this dedicated when I compete? I'll bet the answer is a resounding "no". And that means you should probably get a small pack put together with your essentials in it. It'll take your overall result to the next level. Two are one. One is none. It may save the day for us too.

## Dealing With An Ankle Sprain

The most common of all ankle injuries, an ankle sprain, occurs when the ligaments surrounding the ankle joint are stretched beyond their ability to withstand the force and end up tearing. The tear can be minor or major and the recovery time generally depends on the degree of the sprain.

The most common cause of an ankle sprain is applying weight to the foot when it is either inverted or in an everted position. Commonly, this happens while running or jumping on an uneven surface.

The foot rolls in (inversion) or out (eversion) and the ligaments are stretched. Occasionally a loud "snap" or "pop" is heard at the time of the sprain. This is usually followed by pain and swelling of the ankle. This type of sprain, while sometimes due to a lack of lower limb strength, endurance or flexibility, is also often the result of a lack of balance.

Ankle sprains are generally classified by the degree of severity. These include:

Grade I - stretch and/or minor tear of the ligament without laxity (loosening).

Grade II - tear of ligament plus some laxity.

Grade III - complete tear of the affected ligament (very loose).

For immediate relief, you can use the R.I.C.E. treatment plan:

Rest: Avoid weight bearing for 24 hours or longer for a severe sprain.

Ice: Apply ice (bagged, crushed ice wrapped in a thin towel) to the ankle joint.

Compression: Wrap the ankle with an elastic bandage (start at the toes and wrap up to the calf).

Elevation: Raise the ankle above the hip or heart to reduce swelling.

After those initial steps, seek professional medical treatment

#### **Dealing With Cramps**

If you've ever had muscle spasms or muscle cramps, you know they can be extremely painful. In some cases, a muscle may spasm so forcefully that it results in a bruise on the skin.



## Cramps usually go away on their own without treatment.

Most muscle spasms and cramps are involuntary contractions of a muscle. A serious muscle spasm doesn't release on its own and requires manual stretching to help relax and lengthen the shortened muscle.

Spasms and cramps can be mild or extremely painful. While they can happen to any skeletal muscle, they are most common in the legs and feet and muscles that cross two joints (the calf muscle, for example). Cramps can involve part of a muscle or all the muscles in a group.

Muscle cramps range in intensity from a slight twitch or tic to severe pain. A cramped muscle can feel rock-hard and last a few seconds to several minutes or longer. It is not uncommon for cramps to ease up and then return several times before they go away entirely.


Cramps usually go away on their own without treatment. but these tips appears to help speed the healing process:

- 1) Stop the activity that caused the cramp.
- 2) Gently stretch and massage the cramping muscle.
- 3) Hold the joint in a stretched position until the cramp

If the cramp does not recede after observing the above, seek professional medical attention.


